Classical conditioning occurs when two stimuli are paired with each other. Usually, one of those stimuli produces a response innately (i.e., without experience). Pavlov called these stimuli unconditioned stimuli (USs) because the response they elicit is not conditional on things other than the US occurring.

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Classical conditioning is a “type of learning”, which had a huge influence on the school of thought in psychology known as behaviorism. It is a learning process which occurs through pairings of two or more types of stimuli’s. Classical conditioning involves placing a neutral signal before a naturally present reflex.

Classical Conditioning Paper When a response is formulated from one stimulus to another unlearned stimulus this process of learning is known as classical conditioning. The most noted theorist of classical condition is Ivan Pavlov for his work with dogs.

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The classical conditioning ideology is one of the ideologies that has given a realistic approach towards defining various phobic responses in victims. When an individual encounters certain situations that causes a lot of fear in several encounters, there is a development of an emotional link in the relation to the stimuli associated with the event.

According to the theory, a new behavior is learned through the process of association. According to the theory mentioned above, two or more stimuli are paired to produce a response.

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Classical conditioning is a type of learning that had a major influence on the school of thought in psychology known as behaviorism. Discovered by Russian physiologist Ivan Pavlov , classical conditioning is a learning process that occurs through associations between an environmental stimulus and a naturally occurring stimulus.

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Also known as Pavlovian or respondent conditioning, classical conditioning is a behaviourist approach that was popularised between 1920 and 1950 that focuses on behaviour analysis theory that dictates psychology should be conducted in a scientific manner, with empirical data

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that is obtained through controlled observation and behaviour measurement.

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A strength of classical conditioning theory is that it is scientific. This is because it's based on empirical evidence carried out by controlled experiments. For example, Pavlov (1902) showed how classical conditioning could be used to make a dog salivate to the sound of a bell. Classical conditioning is also a reductionist explanation of behavior. This is because a complex behavior is broken down into smaller stimulus-response units of behavior.

Although the processes differ to quite an extent, they tend to complement one another, and the ultimate result of both concepts is learning.

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Classical conditioning is a type of learning in which an organism learns to transfer a natural response from one stimulus to another, previously neutral stimulus. Manipulating reflexes does this. Operant conditioning is a type of learning in which the likelihood of a behavior is increased or decreased by the use of reinforcement or punishment. Operant conditioning deals with more cognitive thought process.

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Classical conditioning differs from operant or instrumental conditioning: in classical conditioning, behaviors are modified through the association of stimuli as described above, whereas in operant conditioning behaviors are modified by the effect they produce (i.e., reward or punishment).

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The theory of Classical conditioning is the process of an unconditioned stimulus becomes conditioned. Classical conditioning was illustrated by Ivan Pavlov by using dogs as the subjects, to show the association of food, dogs and a bell.
